

LOCATION

EDAR SPRINGS is located in the Township of Nelson, in the County of Halton, one-half mile south of the Village of Kilbride, fifteen miles north from the City of Hamilton and thirty-five miles south-west from the City of Toronto. Paved roads exist the greater portion of the distance, the balance consisting of good stone and gravel roads. The property can be easily reached from Hamilton via Waterdown and Lake Medad or via Waterdown, Carlisle and Kilbride or over the Guelph Highway to the Ninth Concession of East Flamboro, then east through Carlisle and Kilbride; from Toronto over the Dundas St. Highway to Nelson Village, thence north and west.

DESCRIPTION

EDAR SPRINGS contains three hundred and thirty acres with lofty hills, shaded valleys and rolling plateaus, the whole landscape is one of enchanting beauty, secluded, yet convenient to the great centres of population such as Toronto, Hamilton, Brantford, Guelph, Galt, Kitchener and many other places. One hundred acres of the land is cleared, the balance being beautifully wooded. In spring creeks Cedar Springs is without a rival. One stream resembling a small river flows through a charming valley for one mile, the entire length of the property. Two brooks wind their way through inviting avenues of shapely cedars where sparkling water plays merrily over moss-covered rocks. Thirty-five thousand brook trout have been placed in these streams. Excellent fishing should be enjoyed within two years.




THE SPRINGS

EDAR SPRINGS derives its name from the thousands of sweet-scented cedars that give charm and beauty to the landscape and from the many springs of cold, sparkling water. Mr. Hugh F. Davis, Chief Chemist of the International Harvester Company of Canada, in his test of the water from Cedar Springs, says: "The samples represent as pure spring water as I have ever seen and should be first-class for bottling purposes." Dr. Deadman, of the City of Hamilton Laboratories, in his Bacteriological Report of the Cedar Springs water, says: "The water is bacteriologically safe, being exceptionally pure. Many travel hundreds of miles to drink water that is not superior to that at Cedar Springs; others go long distances to inhale the health-giving ozone from the Cedar, Balsam and Pine." Whereas one can motor from the heart of Hamilton to the heart of nature at Cedar Springs in thirty minutes and derive these self-same benefits. A summer home at Cedar Springs will pay dividends in health and happiness to both young and old.


AS A SUMMER CAMP


Its measure would entice me Uncumbered by the clay, Its melody suffice me Till drooped the heavenly day. Then its all-liquid laughter

LOG CABINS

HESE log cabins, along with the plot of land, will range in price from \$750.00 to \$2,000.00, according to the size of the cabin required and the parcel of land purchased. The log cabin is in many ways the ideal holiday house; it represents the return to the primitive, a complete escape from the every-day living; it is architecture gone back to nature and it provides a way for people to live in comfort. When there are sufficient summer residents at Cedar Springs a community building could be built. This, along with the separate cabins, would permit families to enjoy all the pleasures of a private summer home, with the added advantage that the mother of the household is freed from kitchen responsibilities and the burden of entertaining that all too frequently falls to her lot in the holiday season.

COST IS MODERATE

ITH these facts in mind the cost per year to own a plot of land and a cabin would not exceed the cost of an outing for the mother and father of the family for only a few weeks in the northern part of the Province, which gives no benefit to the children of the family, but by locating at Cedar Springs the whole family obtain all the benefits which only two could receive from the trip north, not only for a few weeks a year, but for many months a year, and at the end of a few years the family owns a permanent summer home surrounded by nature, close to the great centres of population, instead of simply having memories of Northern Ontario.



He doesn't knock his fellow men, Or harbor any grudges then; A feller's at his finest when Out fishin'.


The rich are comrades to the poor,
